Youth Theatre with a Social Conscience – Disability in Singapore

M1 Peer Pleasure Youth Theatre Festival by ArtsWok Collaborative, in collaboration with Esplanade – Theatres on the Bay will be having its last iteration this year after a wonderful run of five years presenting original plays, with M1 ceasing its support as titular donor for most of its sponsored festivals. This does not mean a definitive end for Peer Pleasure programmes: as the presenter, it is a crucial moment for us to hit pause and re-evaluate how we may do youth development work in a different format.

While the last year coincides with the unprecedented circumstances of Covid-19, the team has decided to keep the festival running in the digital realm, making M1 Peer Pleasure one of the few productions still going on. The festival will be going out in a meaningful and special way:

Already in the early stages, the situation influenced the title of the festival commission, **What If**, reflective of the uncertainty of the everyday. We already have a different perspective from what we had at the beginning of the year. With this paradigm shift, the festival invites us further into different modes of thinking, and to consider the perspectives of people in our society who have had to live with a different perspective even before this. This year, the festival is focusing on the issue of Disability.

How may we think out of the box? Together with you, through the festival pieces, we will ask:

How do differently-abled people live in Singapore?

Who and where are they? Where are their voices and stories in our everyday?

In a country that prizes efficiency, productivity and material success, can people with disabilities have a place in our economy, schools and community?

Artistic Director Jean Ng has said: "Since embarking on the research process for our festival, more issues and complexities have been excavated. We met different disabled communities with diverse sensitivities, concerns and perspectives." Among these people, the festival team has met many talented artists who have disabilities. This year, we would like to encourage more opportunities in mainstream platforms, such as theatre, to be given to disabled artists, for they have a heartfelt desire to create, collaborate and perform.

Director of What If Okorn-Kuo Jing Hong shares: "For me, I'm not working with a group of people with disabilities. For me, I'm working with a group of people who have a non-mainstream perspective. So in that sense, I want to move beyond the comfort zone and see if there's any way to move perspectives and expression towards something different from what we're used to."

What If will explore what it means to be human, through four different performances. Due to the current circumstances, the festival has been provided with conditions to think out of the blackbox of traditional theatre. The team is diverse and alongside the cast, who each have a disability, five theatre designers have been included in the devising process, blurring the lines between actor, designer, director. Set and visual designer Timothy Trung Hua, whose involvement is part of his final year project for his Diploma in Visual Communication at Nanyang Polytechnic's School of Design, comments on this unique arrangement: "There is no script, no plan, and no safety net for me to develop on something from the very start. This has pushed me to start thinking outside the box where it doesn't just have to be limited to design and visuals only." Timothy is deaf, and has said this does not hinder his dream to create designs to support and communicate with people.

And to bring these performances online and in real time, we have New Media Director Lim Shengen, who will be "offering technical expertise to ensure that the aesthetic affect of traditional theatre is conveyed well on a digital platform, and through that, engender new experiences and new aesthetics for audiences through What If." The four different performances will feature a mixture of pre-recorded and live performance, with some elements of audience participation for all of the performances.

Original plays *The Other People* and *If These Wheels Could Speak*, devised and read by students from Dunman High School and Tanjong Katong Girls' School respectively will also be screened online. After a 1.5 year-long journey to learn more about disability in Singapore through research and meeting people who live with disabilities, these students chose to focus on attention deficit hyperactivity disorder

and cerebral palsy respectively. A connection made with Stephanie Esther Fam, one of the actors of *What If*, inspired the students of Tanjong Katong Girls' School to make the heroine of their play a girl with cerebral palsy. Due to the schools' Drama Clubs not being able to meet for months, students have not been able to rehearse their plays and will be presenting them as staged readings instead.

In addition to these, multi-sensory interactive theatre piece *Riley's Rain* created and performed by Republic Polytechnic, and devised and directed by Gloria Tan and Samantha Bounaparte, expands the horizons of sensory theatre by facilitating through video performance an interactive, sensory experience for children and their caregivers. Specially designed for children and young persons with autism spectrum disorder and sensory sensitivities, a craft kit to facilitate the tactility of the performance will be sent out to a limited number of audience members, while remaining audiences can download the kit online for self-assembling, allowing them to have a sensory-friendly experience.

Producer of M1 Peer Pleasure, and Executive Director of ArtsWok Collaborative, Ngiam Su-Lin shares: "It has been a real privilege presenting this annual youth theatre festival and to interact with many young people who have so much desire to create, express, connect and make a difference through their theatre-making. They are a force, and voice that needs to continue being engaged, and encouraged, especially in these extremely dynamic and challenging times. It is their creativity, imagination and courage that will lead society forward."

Jing Hong started training in Classical Ballet with Goh Lay Kuan. Between 2006 and 2008, she trained with Phillip Zarrilli at Exeter University (UK) with support from the Singapore National Arts Council. As a Director and Choreographer, her works are mostly physical or movement-based. As a performer, she performs in styles ranging from dance to drama. As a teacher, she teaches her style of psycho-physical approach to performance.

She has directed productions in Singapore, Austria and Taiwan, with notable productions such as *The Ordinary and The Unspectacular* (2018) and *Play Play* (2016), by The Theatre Practice in Singapore. *The Day Before I Am Born* was presented by Forum Stadtpark in Graz, Austria in 2018. Presently, Jing Hong is based in Austria and is interested in the application of actor-training and theatre-making to senior communities.

# Tan Beng Tian Assistant Director

Tan Beng Tian is an independent Theatre Practitioner. In 1994, she left for Fujian, China, to undertake an intensive course on traditional hand puppetry from renowned late puppet master Li Bofen. She is a recipient of the Japanese Chamber of Commerce & Industry, Singapore Foundation Culture Award 2005 for her excellent work in promoting puppetry in Singapore. With this deep-rooted belief, she uses her innate flair with words to create original works of poetry that reflect her lived experiences, thoughts and viewpoints that would otherwise lie dormant. Her decade-long experience on the public speaking platform of Toastmasters International allows her to encourage, motivate and inspire live audiences through meticulously crafted speeches. She recently ventured into theatre-making, and was cast in *And Suddenly I Disappear: The Singapore 'd' Monologues* in 2018, the first disability-led theatre project created between the UK and Singapore theatre. She strives to be a voice advocating for disability-led practices within the artistic community.

Hidayat is a guide at *Dialogue In the Dark* (DiD). His passion for performing arts started when his manager invited him to be a part of a Cajon ensemble for their annual *Concert In the Dark*, back in 2014. It made him happy, that he could in a small way, make the audiences enjoy themselves. He was also the voice actor of a play that was created by DiD in 2017, and was given the opportunity to perform at Esplanade last year as part of the Red Dot programme during the National Day week. Hidayat is also para-athlete on the national team and plays a competitive ball sport for the blind called goalball.

## **Performer**

Shawn is a self-taught dancer who enjoys spending his free time learning the latest K-pop moves. His most recent dance credits include *What Simon Didn't Say* in 2019 and *A Green Dot* in 2018 by contemporary dance group, A Little Raw Company. Shawn was also featured in works by internationally-acclaimed artists such as the French choreographer, Mr Jerome Bel. Also a pioneer member of Very Special Theatrics, led by Mr R Chandran, Shawn has taken on lead acting roles in their adaptation of *Peter and the Wolf* as well as the original work, *My Home Is Not A Shell*, conceptualised in collaboration with No Strings Attached Theatre of Disability from Australia and presented at the True Colours Festival 2018.

# Tung Ka Wai Performer

Ka Wai holds a Master of Fine Arts (Playwriting) from Taipei National University of the Arts and a Bachelor of Arts with Honours (Chinese Studies) from National University of Singapore. His recent theatre projects include *Because it's Fun* (The Fool Theatre), *A Grinder's Diary* (a work-in-progress by Access Path Productions and Pitapat Theatre), *The 'd' Monologues: A Lecture-Performance by Kaite O'Reilly* (Access Path Productions) and *Eve of the Wedding Day* (a skit by Singapore Chinese Orchestra and Capital 958). He also teaches Chinese at local language centres and is the drama instructor for Nanyang Junior College, Chinese Cultural Society.

# Wan Wai Yee Performer

Wai Yee is a talented and experienced singer who has been performing since 1995. Her repertoire consist mainly of popular music and broadway musical songs and has sung for private events like weddings, parties and corporate functions. She has also done musicals and voiceovers, performed at The Purple Symphony concert, and recently started storytelling too. In 2019, she underwent her first vocal examination in musical theatre grade 5 given by the London College Of Music for which she earned a distinction. She is currently in her third year of a scholarship funded by the Purple Symphony Award Training Program, learning vocal techniques.
